

A session on Polish ethnicity and mixed media highlighted the 2006 Annual Meeting of the Polish American Historical Association in Philadelphia, William Grabowski combined family heirlooms and pictures. While Grabowski sells his works, he also accepts commissions for works built around family heirlooms. Kathryn Schutta juxtaposed commercial images in different contexts. Session Chair Ann Hetzel Gunkel explained how their works reflect the Polish American spirit while not necessarily using readily identifiable Polish American imagery.





Oskar Halecki Prize recognizes an important book or monograph on the Polish experience in the United States. Eligibility is limited to works of historical and/or cultural interest, including those in the social sciences or humanities, published in 2005 and 2006.

Creative Arts Award recognizes the contributions in the field of creative arts by individuals or groups who have promoted an awareness of the Polish experience in the Americas.

Civic Achievement Awards honor individuals or groups who advance PAHA's goals of promoting research and awareness of the Polish experience in the Americas.

Amicus Poloniae Award recognizes significant contributions enhancing knowledge of the Polish and Polish American heritage by individuals not belonging to the Polish American community.

Kulczycki Prize recognizes an important dissertation on the Polish experience in the United States offered to a graduate student or younger scholar within the first five years after awarding of the doctorate degree to assist in the publication of a book or monograph.

Distinguished Service Award is given occasionally to a member of PAHA who has rendered valuable and sustained service to the organization.

Mieczyslaw Haiman Award is offered annually to an American scholar for sustained contribution to the study of Polish Americans.

President Nudges PAHA in New Directions

At the PAHA Awards Banquet in Philadelphia, Mary Erdmans' presidential address outlined three organizational and scholarly directives.

First, she suggested that, as an organization, we more enthusiastically promote Polonian research by providing financial support for the collection of data, including, but not limited to, funds for travel to documents, translations, and transcriptions. She urged the organization to support the "messiness of research and not just the glitter of achievement."

Second, she encouraged us to engage in more research about the everyday life worlds of the working class and the poor. It is important, she argued, that we spend more time understanding these members of Polonia hitherto less visible in our scholarly writings.

In order to accomplish this, her third suggestion was that we collect more oral histories or life narratives from Polonians whose voices are not found in organizational publications, from people who are not public actors but who are instead found in the home, the garden, the church pew (rather than the altar), the streetscapes, the local bars, and the otherwise not formally organized venues.

New Student Paper Award

The Polish American Historical Association is delighted to announce its annual Graduate Research Paper Award competition. The award's purpose is to stimulate research into Polish-American history and culture and to recognize outstanding work by a young scholar in the humanities or social sciences. The award includes the opportunity to present the paper as part of the program of the Polish American Historical Association's conference, which is organized in conjunction with the American Historical Association's annual meeting. The winner will receive a stipend of \$200 to offset costs associated with travel to the conference. In addition the essay will be considered for publication in the PAHA journal, *Polish American Studies*.

The Awards Committee solicits either direct submissions or faculty nominations of substantial original research papers, not longer than approximately 35 pages (ca. 9,000 words). The candidate for the award must be a graduate student at the time of the application or nomination. A current c.v. and a one page summary of the essay must accompany the submission. Of these, six volumes already have appeared; two other books are forthcoming: Jerzy Andrzejewski, Holy Week, translated by Oscar Swan; and Ewa Plach, The Clash of Moral Nations: Cultural Politics in Pilsudski's Poland, 1926-1935.
