Encyclopedia Progress Report

We are pleased to report that the PAHA \$60,000 encyclopedia project is progressing well. As of July 1, more that 1,500 topics have been suggested for entries. Of these, 143 have been rejected, largely because they \$45,000 either proposed biographies of people who were not Polish, they dealt with topics that were exclusively Polish and not Polish-American, or they proposed \$30,000 people or topics that did not meet the test of significance. Of the remaining 1,453 suggested entries, \$15,000 1,037 have been assigned to nearly 100 authors and 337 have been completed. The total completed word count as of July 1 was 178,553. The estimated final word count should be between 500,000 and 700,000 words depending on the size of the remaining entries. Authors for the remaining entries are still being sought, so if you are interested in working on one or more entries please contact the editor, James Pula, at ipula@pnc.edu.

Fundraising for the project is continuing. As of July 1, the project has raised \$37,821.27 and has another \$9,000 in pledges for a total of \$46,821.27—78.0% of our goal. During the fall PAHA will be making another fundraising push to guarantee successful completion of the project. Your contributions would be greatly appreciated. A list of donors as of July 1 appears elsewhere in this issue to recognize those who have thus far made financial contributions to the project. PAHA would particularly like to thank The Kosciuszko Foundation and its president, Joseph Gore, for the Foundation's exceptional grant of \$15,000 toward this project, and for the confidence that this grant expresses in the encyclopedia and in PAHA's work.

PAHA would also like to thank the following organizations and list serves for publicizing the encyclopedia project: the Polish Institute of Arts & Sciences, the *Polish American Journal*, the Polish American Forum, H-Ethnic and H-NET.

The Editor wishes to thank all of those who have participated in the project to this point, and especially those who have donated funds and authors who have completed their entries on time or, in many cases, ahead of time. This is a group project, and the support of so many people is both necessary for its successful completion and appreciated.

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PRESIDENT'S NOTES FROM THE PAHA BOARD'S MIDYEAR MEETING IN WILLIMANTIC, CT

On June 7, 2008, members of the PAHA Board of Directors met for the midyear meeting on the campus of Eastern Connecticut State University in Willimantic, CT. The meeting was partially sponsored by the Dean of the ECSU School of Arts and Sciences and the ECSU Department of History. Present members and officers included: President Anna D. Jaroszynska-Kirchmann, Treasurer and *Polish American Studies* Editor James S. Pula, Publications Committee Chair John J. Bukowczyk, Secretary and *Newsletter* Editor Stephen M. Leahy, Interim Executive Director Pien Versteegh, and Board members M. B. Biskupski, Mary P. Erdmans, Tom Duszak, and Iwona Drag Korga.

For the news on the progress of the work on the Encyclopedia, which was discussed during the opening meeting, please see Dr. Pula's report elsewhere in this *Newsletter*. Following the approval of January minutes, the officers presented their reports. According to the President's report, PAHA conference in Washington, D.C., has been very successful, with several very well- attended sessions. Thanks to Dr. Janusz Zalewski, Dr. John Guzlowski, and Dr. Brian McCook, also the PAHA awards banquet and program at the Embassy of Poland proved to be both a very pleasant and moving evening, during which several Polish American poets presented their poetry, honoring the Zbigniew Herbert Year. The Embassy, and particularly Dr. Mariusz Brymora and Dr. Andrzej Rabczenko, deserve special appreciation for hosting this event.

In March, 2008, PAHA co-sponsored with Pilsudski Institute a one-day conference on teaching Poland's and Polonia's history in the U.S. It was hosted by the Kosciuszko Foundation and resulted in many interesting and important papers and presentations. Video from the conference is available at the Pilsudski Institute's web site. The conference is a great example of the type of collaboration with other Polonia professional organizations of which PAHA would like to pursue more in the future. We are grateful to the Pilsudski Institute and especially to our own board member and the Institute's Executive Director Dr. Iwona Korga for their leadership in this project.

Following a year and a half of efforts, PAHA has regained its tax exempt status and is currently in good standing with the IRS. PAHA is also now registered with the State of Connecticut Department of Consumer Protection, and is incorporated in the State of Connecticut.

The PAHA Online Committee, headed by the President and including Pien Versteegh, John Guzlowski, and Ann Gunkel worked with the website builder and designer Marcin Witruszynski on the new website. The work on the website is progressing according to plan and the new website should be available to the members shortly (see elsewhere in the *Newsletter* for more information on the new website).

David J. Professor **Thaddeus Piotrowski** was awarded a Certificate of Merit (Duplom Uznania) by the Warsaw-based Association of Combat Veterans and Former Political Prisoners of the Republic of Poland. The document reads: "For outstanding services in the public sphere in behalf of combat veterans associations, including those from the borderlands, and for popularizing and preserving the memory of the people and their deeds in the struggle for Polish independence during World War II and after its conclusion." He also gave a talk ("The Polish Deportees of World War II") at McGill University in Montreal. The talk was sponsored by the McGill University History Department, The Polish Institute of Arts and Sciences in Canada, and The Canadian Foundation for Polish Studies.

James S. He is the general editor for 2nd edition of the Encyclopedia of American Immigration.

Samull gave a slide program on Polish customs at the Shelby Township Public Library.

Henry (Hank) P. Silka, an avid maritime historian, died April 15th, 2008 at the age of 76. He became enchanted with the sea as a child while observing the greater New York Harbor region. After serving in the army, Silka worked as a foreign press correspondent in Asia. Later, he worked as a technical editor. Upon his retirement, he wrote maritime history and helped preserve historic maritime sites. He also studied Polish and became an active member of the Polish American Historical Association.

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President's Report Continued

The First Vice President's (Dr. Ann Hetzel Gunkel) report indicated that the January 2-4, 2009, PAHA conference will take place in New York City in conjunction with the annual meeting of the American Historical Association. Please look for more information elsewhere in this *Newsletter*.

The Second Vice President's (Dr. Brian McCook) report commented on the work of the Awards Committee, which he heads, and which includes Dr. Ann Gunkel, Dr. Neal Pease, and Dr. Bill Galush. Dr. Pien Versteegh, and Interim Executive Director, presented a business plan to improve PAHA's visibility among Polonia, professional organizations, as well as Poland's universities and institutions.

The Treasurer's (Dr. James Pula) report indicated that PAHA's finances are stable, but the necessity to fund the Encyclopedia, website, and mounting of the journal on electronic databases will challenge our budget. The Treasurer recommended that no new projects be undertaken until current obligations are met.

Dr. Stephan Leahy, the *Newsletter* Editor, reported on the *Newsletter*. Dr. James Guzlowski will serve as an Assistant Editor. Dr. James Pula, the Editor-in-Chief of the *Polish American Studies* reported that the Spring 2008 issue discussed ethnic historical societies. Guest editors Anna Jaroszynska-Kirchmann and Suzanne M. Sinke prepared the issue. The journal continues to solicit article submissions. PAHA has also signed agreements with the History Cooperative and JSTOR for including *Polish American Studies* in their electronic databases.

Dr. John Bukowczyk reported that the Ohio University Press Polish and Polish-American Studies Series has already published eight volumes (please see an ad for the OUP series elsewhere in this *Newsletter*), two other books currently are in press, and two additional manuscripts are currently under review. The series is still soliciting new manuscripts.

Mr. Tom Duszak, chair of PAHA Polish American Studies e-Access Committee, presented his report, which reviewed the process of joining the History Cooperative and JSTOR by *Polish American Studies*. The following discussion centered on the pro's and con's of joining the EBSCO database and/or mounting the journal with the University of Illinois. The board decided to authorize the committee to continue exploring our options in this matter. The nominating Committee, headed by Dr. Mary Erdmans will organize Fall elections. This committee will include the past two presidents and the current president.

Rudolph J. Vecoli dies at the age of 81

A premier immigration historian Professor Rudolph J. Vecoli died on June 17, 2008. He was 81 years old.

Vecoli was born in Wallingford, Connecticut, speaking Italian at home. Vecoli served in the Navy and then earned degrees from the University of Connecticut, the University of Pennsylvania, and the University of Wisconsin. His Ph.D. dissertation examined the communities of Southern Italians in Chicago prior to World War I. As part of the research for his dissertation, Vecoli conducted extensive interviews with immigrants in Chicago, observing and engaging the community.

Vecoli's article "Contadini in Chicago: A Critique of the Uprooted," which appeared in 1963, became a watershed in the discipline of the immigration and ethnic history. Vecoli worked in the History Department of the University of Minnesota. In 1967 he created the Immigration History Research Center, an institution, which he headed till his retirement. In 2004, PAHA granted Rudy Vecoli the Amicus Poloniae Award. His citation read: "For Polish Americans, Rudy has been instrumental in promoting The Polish American Studies Fund to support the Polish American Collection."
