





President Anna Jaroszyńska-Kirchmann's Notes from the PAHA Board's Annual Meeting in New York City, January 3, 2009

The Board meeting took place on January 3, 2009 in New York. It was the last meeting of the President Kirchmann's board. The following board members and officers were present: Dr. James Pula, Dr. M.B. Biskupski, Dr. John Guzlowski, Dr. Iwona Korga, Dr. Stephen Leahy, Dr. Brian McCook, Dr. Ann Hetzel Gunkel, Mr. Thomas Duszak, Dr. Anna Jaroszynska-Kirchmann, Dr. Mary Erdmans, and Dr. Pien Versteegh.

In her report, the president updated the board on several completed as well as ongoing projects. The new PAHA website is now fully operational. Members are encouraged to use it, including paying their membership dues through an online option. Dr. John Guzlowski was appointed an Online Director. PAHA welcomes Mr. Mark Zawisny, attorney-at-law as our new pro bono lawyer! At the suggestion of the president, the board adopted also an official Polish-language version of PAHA's name which is Polsko-Amerykanskie Towarzystwo Historyczne. In close collaboration with Dr. Adam Walaszek of the Jagiellonian University, Krakow, Poland, president Kirchmann continues to work on the planned research program, which may lead to a number of initiatives, including a couple of conferences and a book publication. The funds still remain an issue. President Kirchmann also prepared applications for grants for the encyclopedia project, which is still in needs of financial support. In conclusion of her report, the president thanked all her colleagues on the board for their hard work, patience, willing cooperation and commitment to making PAHA a modern professional organization that it deserves to be.

Dr. Ann Hetzel Gunkel, PAHA's First VP presented her report, commenting on the organization of the conference. Due to the increase in her professional duties, Dr. Gunkel was unable to assume the office of PAHA president. She will, however, remain on the PAHA board and organize future conferences.

Dr. Brian McCook, PAHA's Second VP, reported on the award process and presented the slot of this year's awardees. The following discussion centered on the ways to publicize our awards program to a wider audience. PAHA's public relations were also a concern for Dr. Versteegh, an Interim Executive Director. In order to reach new members PAHA will start a campaign to recruit new members in the new year.

Dr. James Pula, the treasurer, presented a report on PAHA's finances. As the economy tumbled, PAHA's investments were also negatively affected. Additional expenses connected with the encyclopedia further weaken our financial base. PAHA members are asked to pay their membership dues in a timely manner to offset a potentially difficult situation for the organization.

Nominations Solicited for PAHA 2009/10 Awards

Nominations are sought for the following awards. Send all nominations to the chair of the awards committee, Dr. Stephen Leahy at **skilleahy@gmail.com**.

The following award nominations must be received by May 1, 2009.

Graduate Student Research Paper Award recognizes an original research paper on Polish-American history and culture produced by a young scholar in the humanities or social sciences. This award includes a \$500 travel grant to present the paper at PAHA's 2009 Annual Meeting. The candidate for the award must be a graduate student at the time of the application or nomination.

The following award nominations must be received by July 15, 2009.

Mieczyslaw Haiman Award is offered annually to an American scholar for sustained contribution to the study of Polish Americans.

Oskar Halecki Prize recognizes an important book or monograph on the Polish experience in the United States. Eligibility is limited to works of historical and/or cultural interest, including those in the social sciences or humanities, published in the two years prior to the year of the award.

Skalny Civic Achievement Award honors individuals or groups who advance PAHA's goals of promoting research and awareness of the Polish-American experience and/or have made significant contributions to Polish or Polish-American community and culture.

Amicus Poloniae Award recognizes significant contributions enhancing knowledge of Polish and Polish-American heritage by individuals not belonging to the Polish-American community.

Distinguished Service Award is given occasionally to a member of PAHA who has rendered valuable and sustained service to the organization.

Useless flowered garments, they should be boxed and given to the poor. I fear we've lost too much in boxing you instead, this crate shipped off to Hades, its cargo—my fate. For I've just sealed this oak chest's heavy lid, forever shutting away the dowry and the bride.

He has translated Adam Mickiewicz's essential Polish poem "Pan Tadeusz" which is available online at HarrowGate Press. He currently teaches religion, philosophy, and art history at Owens College in Ohio. He is married to the artist/printmaker, Mania Dajnak.

ENCYCLOPEDIA UPDATE

PAHA's project to create an encyclopedia based on the Polish experience in America is moving toward completion. As of March 1, 2009, more than 100 authors have completed over 658 entries totaling more than 402,000 words. The completed project will contain over 1,000 entries, as well as photographs and other illustrations. President's Report Continued

In his capacity as the Editor of the *Polish American Studies* and Chair of the Publication's Committee, Dr. Pula reported that the journal enjoys a nice rate of submissions. During the last year the *Polish American Studies* were accepted for membership in the JSTOR and History Cooperative electronic journal collections, giving us a global exposure. Dr. Pula thanked especially John Bukowczyk and Tom Duszak for their leadership in this process. Dr. Pula also announced the sad news about the death of Joseph Skalny of the Skalny Foundation, which has been so generous to *Polish American Studies* for over a quarter century. Taking into consideration the Skalny family's strong sense of community service, the editor proposed to rename PAHA's Civic Achievement Award as "The Skalny Civic Achievement Award." The board voted unanimously to accept this motion.

Dr. Stephen Leahy, the *Newsletter* Editor, discussed some suggestions to improve the newsletter. The poetry corner was found to be a very welcome addition. Dr. John Bukowczyk's report indicated that so far nine volumes have already appeared in the Ohio University Press Polish and Polish-American Studies Series. Two other books currently are in press, one other is under contract, and two additional manuscripts and several proposals are currently under review. The series continues to solicit new projects and manuscripts. Board and all PAHA members are encouraged to promote the books.

Dr. Pula then provided an update on the encyclopedia project – please see elsewhere for it in this newsletter. Mr. Tom Duszak presented an in-depth report on the work of the e-Access Committee, which he headed. This report will be a basis for a more permanent e-Access Committee, which will continue to monitor our options in this area. Dr. Mary Erdmans announced the results of the PAHA board elections which were conducted in the fall. Ballots were sent to 473 members; 100 ballots were returned. Please see elsewhere in this newsletter for the list of the new board members and officers. A constitutional amendment was also approved. Article 10, section 3 shall now read: "The candidates for elective office shall be selected by a Nominating Committee, which will consist of the two immediate past presidents and the current president of the organization." The board agreed that the least recent ex-president will chair this committee. Special elections for the position of the First VP will be held in the Spring (see ballot enclosed in this newsletter).

The board then discussed PAHA's relationships with several other Polonia organizations, including the Pilsudski Institute, Polish Institute of Arts and Sciences, World Research Council, and the ACPC. The board considered a possibility to hold its midyear meeting in conjunction with the PIASA conference in Jersey City, June 13-14, 2009.

The board members and conference participants attended a reception at the PIASA headquarters on the evening of January 2, where they had a chance to view PIASA's archives and library. On the evening of January 3, the PAHA annual awards reception took place in the historic building of the Consulate of Poland in New York. The board would like to thank Mr. Przemyslaw Balcerzyk and the Consulate staff for their hospitality and generosity. The next PAHA conference will take place in San Diego, California in January 2010. Please look for the information on the arrangements and call for papers elsewhere in this newsletter.
